#BackToSchool season is here, and students across the nation are returning to the classroom. Now is an important time to talk to the students in your life about #HumanTrafficking — a crime that poses unique dangers to young people. Making sure students understand the <u>warning</u> <u>signs of human trafficking</u> and how to protect themselves from the crime can prevent exploitation and save lives. That's why the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's (DHS)



Blue Campaign created a variety of resources for young people, adults working with youth, and campus law enforcement professionals.

Whether you're a student or someone who interacts with students, the following resources can help keep young people safe during the #BackToSchool season:

- Pocket-sized youth indicator card highlighting signs of potential victims and potential traffickers.
- <u>Human trafficking response toolkits</u> for school resource officers, student leaders on college campuses, campus law enforcement, and youth.
- <u>"Mia's Story"</u>: A four-part animated video series that depicts the experience of a young girl being trafficked from the perspective of different individuals in her life.
- <u>Protect Yourself webpage highlighting what exploitation looks like and how it starts.</u>
- Youth poster series highlighting the role social media can play in a trafficking situation. Available in both English and Spanish.
- Youth professional and caretaker training lessons: A two-part online training highlighting what human trafficking is, why youth are vulnerable, and the role of professionals and caretakers in helping to prevent and report this crime.

AGENDA ITEMS:

Meeting was called to order at 1:00pm by Michelle Aldrich.

Introductions.

Since there were some newer members attending, each attendee introduced herself to the group.

Foundation and Board Discussion.

Kristie Wilson began the discussion with an overview of the Foundation and the relationship between Zonta Foundation and Zonta Club. She noted the 501c3 tax exempt status belongs to the Foundation, while the Club received 501c4 status within the last few years. Zonta Foundation was formed approximately 10 years ago for fund raising purposes. Many donors want to be able to deduct their donations, which is allowable when donating to a 501c3 entity. Additionally, some grants require grantees to have 501c3 status. Zonta Foundation can give funds to entities other than Zonta Club, but it does give primarily to Zonta Club. The Foundation is funded primarily through sharing various Club fundraising activities. As of the end of July, the Foundation has just over \$40,000 in savings. While the Foundation and the Club are independent entities with neither having authority over the other, the Foundation requests whenever possible that the Club plan and communicate funding needs in advance to avoid management by crisis, particularly when arranging large events such as Cancel Out. There was additional discussion regarding how future fund-raising proceeds should be distributed (i.e., shared with Zonta International, Club, Foundation, etc.), and whether that information should be communicated to donors and others in advance of fund-raising activities.

Proposed By-Laws.

Proposed by-laws were reviewed. No changes were requested other than minor formatting corrections. Dasa Robertson made a motion that the corrected proposed by- laws be submitted to membership for review prior to the September meeting. Betty Abernethy seconded the motion, which was passed unanimously with no further discussion.

Strategic Planning.

Membership Committee:

- This committee is in the process of re-forming after losing some members, and getting some new.
- Committee goals are to recruit, involve, and retain members.

The Cancel Out event increases interest from prospective members, as does inviting non-members to Zunco and other social events. The committee's intent is to host a Zunco event quarterly, following up with non-member attendees after.

- There was additional discussion about ways to improve communication regarding what is available for new members to do, and what is expected. Some new members are overwhelmed because they aren't sure what they should be doing. Suggested means of communication included maintaining the calendar on the web site, and providing information in the Zephyr and at monthly meetings.
- New member brochures may be updated with more complete information about committee activities.

Communications Committee:

Goals -

- Continue to maintain up to date information on the Club website.
- Provide more specific information in the subject line of emails (some recipients are uncertain which emails pertain directly to them).
- Maintain an up-to-date on-line calendar of events. Possibly assign someone to maintain a presence in social media such as Facebook and possibly What's Up.

Finance Committee:

- The major fundraiser is Cancel Out, with the next event to be in March 2024. We also participated in WyoGives which provided approximately \$1,500 between direct donations and matching funds.
- It was agreed we should continue to participate in WyoGives and also get on the list to participate in Thankful Thursday. It may take several years to work our way up the list to actually be eligible to participate, and we can opt out during that time should we decided to do so.
- Scholarships and awards we currently pay out include Jane M. Klaussman Woman in Business Scholarship, Women in Aviation Scholarship, Young Women in Public Affairs Award, and Laramie County Community College Scholarship. There was discussion about possibly initiating a Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics (STEM) scholarship.
- Additional budget discussion centered on expenses currently exceeding income, and how to solve that problem. Suggestions included looking at additional fund-raising opportunities as well as retaining a portion of Cancel Out proceeds to help cover Club expenses.

Advocacy and Service:

Current activities include

16 Days of Advocacy/Silent Witness March (November 20 during noon hour). We will once again try to get both the Governor and the Mayor to issue resolutions or proclamations.
