UPDATE ON THE ZONTA OF CHEYENNE FOUNDATION

The Zonta of Cheyenne Foundation Board of Directors met on October 25 th . Since the Foundation has in excess of \$37,000 and interest rates are in the range of 5%, the decision was made to put \$25,000 into a 12-month certificate of deposit. This will allow funds that are not expected to be needed in the near future to grow through interest, while still leaving funds available should they be needed.

The Foundation Board also decided to join the Wyoming Non-Profit Network and to participate as a financial sponsor for the Zonta Club of Cheyenne in the 2024 WyoGives campaign. This fundraising event is scheduled to take place July 10, 2024 but a fair amount of work will need to be done in advance to get the most out of it. The Foundation hopes to work hand-in-hand with the Club to raise as many funds as possible.

16 DAYS OF ACTIVISM AGAINST GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE

The 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence is an international campaign originated in 1991 by the Center for Women's Global Leadership at Rutgers University. Since 1991, more than 6,000 organizations from an estimated 187 countries have participated. This campaign starts on November 25th (the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women) and ends on December 10th(International Human Rights Day.)

The color of these 16 Days of Activism is orange. This color is used because it is a bright and optimistic color, symbolizing a brighter future. Wearing orange during this period demonstrates one's solidarity in eliminating all forms of violence.

In honor of these 16 days, all members and their guests are invited to participate in three Club activities:

► A signing ceremony of a proclamation regarding 16 Days of Activism to be issued by Governor Gordon. The signing ceremony will take place at the Capitol (near the Governor's Office) on November 14th at 10:30 a.m.

A signing ceremony of a proclamation to be issued by Mayor Collins. This will take place at the Mayor's office on November 20^{th} at 2:30 p.m.

► A Silent Witness March and Victim Remembrance to take place on Monday, November 20th. The participants for the March should gather at 11:45 a.m. in front of the Wyoming Supreme Court Building, with the walk to the Laramie County Library beginning at noon. Once arriving at the Library, there will be a relatively short reading of the stories of some of the victims being remembered at the commemoration. The silhouettes of victims will remain at the library through about noon on December 7th.

The October Membership Meeting was held on Zoom on October 12, 2023, at noon.

Meeting was called to order at 12:00pm by Dr. Michelle Aldrich. The guest speaker, Barbara Archambeau, LCSW, who is the VA Intimate Partner Violence Assistance Program Coordinator presented about IPV. A synopsis is included on page 9 of this newsletter.

Minutes of the last meeting and the Treasurer's report were adopted as presented, and the Treasurer's report was filed for audit.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Advocacy: October 20 is purple day – wear purple! October 21 is the date we will be filling Hope Bags. SANE nurses are leaning towards maintaining a clothes closet instead of bags because the combination of items in a particular bag may not fit a particular individual, leading to taking items from multiple bags to meet the needs of a given person. We may need to reevaluate our donation efforts depending on added feedback from hospital SANE nurses. The Silent Witness March will be November 20, at noon. The march will begin at the Supreme Court Building. The Art Contest Reception will be April 15. Display dates for the artwork are yet to be determined. Red Sand Project - no date has been set, but the committee is looking at April or May. The date of the November committee meeting has not yet been decided.

Communications: Nothing new to report.

Membership: We had 11 people at the recent Zunco night. The next Zunco night is planned for late January or early February. The committee is planning impromptu Zappy Hour events. There will be approximately72 hours notice in advance of each of these social events. One new application from Amy Mavy has been approved by the Board. The next meeting will be a joint meeting of the Communications and the Membership committees on November 6, 5:30pm, at Betty Abernethy's house.

OLD BUSINESS

Cancel Out beneficiary for 2024: Two beneficiaries have previously been discussed: Unaccompanied Student Initiative, and Uprising. Additional information had been requested from Uprising because it is located in Sheridan and provides services throughout the state. Our contacts at Uprising assured us they can earmark any donated funds to local efforts and/or develop a specific project for us. They suggested training/education events to be presented at LCCC, but are open to other ideas as well. A motion was made and seconded to select Uprising as the beneficiary of a portion of Cancel Out proceeds with the donated funds to be used for a project specific to Laramie County, inviting Unaccompanied Student Initiative to participate as well. The motion passed.

Cancel Out proceeds distribution for 2024: The Cancel Out Committee proposed the following distribution of proceeds: 30% to Zonta International; 30% to the selected beneficiary; up to \$10,000 to Zonta Club for service and advocacy projects; remainder to Zonta Foundation. A motion was made and seconded to adopt the distribution proposed by the Cancel Out Committee. The motion passed.

October Guest Speaker Re-cap

Guest Speaker: Barbara Archambeau, LCSW; Veterans Administration Intimate Partner Violence Assistance Program Coordinator

The Veterans Administration (VA) uses the Centers for Disease Control's definition of Intimate Partner Violence (IPV), which is: IPV describes physical, sexual, or psychological harm or stalking behavior by a current or former partner that occurs on a continuum of frequency and severity ranging from emotional abuse to chronic, severe battering, or even death. It can occur in heterosexual or same-sex relationships and does not require sexual intimacy or cohabitation. IPV disproportionately affects veterans. One in three women and one in four men experience IPV within the general population. The numbers are double within the Veteran population. IPV may lead to increased risk of divorce/broken families, homelessness, joblessness, poverty, increased health needs, suicide and/or homicide.

The IPV program at the VA serves veterans as well as non-veteran partners of veterans who use violence, and includes: Raising awareness though awareness events, IPV campaigns, materials, as well as staff training; Building community partnerships though outreach events; Serving those who experience IPV through implementing routine screening and establishing intervention plans, resources.; Serving VA staff through building internal collaborations with Employee Assistance, Workplace Safety, etc.

The VA program also provides the following interventions through

its IPV program: Screening and assessment; Safety planning; Education; Resource; Community collaboration.; Individual and group therapy.

The Cheyenne VA Hospital is one of ten VA sites included in a 2year pilot program authorized by the Megabus Legislation Pilot Program, with the goal of assessing the feasibility and advisability of providing sexual assault services. The program requires services be provided to all eligible veterans, extends services for sexual assault not occurring in the context of intimate relationships, and also extends services for sexual assault occurring at times other than during military service.

Mobile apps that may provide resources to those who experience IPV and other sexual assault: RAINN gives survivors of sexual violence and their loved ones access to support, self-care tools, and information to help manage short- and long-term effects of sexual violence. (RAINN mobile app); MyPlan is designed to help identify, navigate, and provide resources for a range of relationship abuse concerns. MyPlan (myplanapp.org); Beyond MST is a free, secure, and private self-help app created specifically to support military survivors and may be helpful to survivors of other types of unwanted sexual experiences. https://tinyurl.com/BeyondMST

Ms. Archambeau ended her presentation by expressing support for Zonta and the VA IPV program to partner in appropriate activities.

LCCC Scholarship Luncheon

Linda Bogart and Jody Gostas attended the LCCC Scholarship Luncheon on Friday, October 27.

This luncheon is held annually for LCCC scholarship donors and scholarship recipients. Linda and I were pleased to be able to attend. I was amazed at how many guests were there. The last time I attended one of these luncheons maybe 10 years ago, there were probably 100 people in attendance. This year I'm estimating over 250 guests attended. It was sponsored by First Interstate Bank, held at the Red Lion Inn, and arranged very comfortably. There were speakers representing the LCCC Foundation Board and Staff, LCCC President, and two non-traditional students. All the speakers seemed to emphasize the importance of the LCCC and "non-trad" student connection.

We were unable to determine if the LCCC Zonta Scholarship recipient was there; if so she didn't sit at our table. Linda and I both thought our club might need to give a little more attention to this scholarship. We don't have a chairperson for the Scholarship Committee where we really need one. Perhaps then we could have had a connection with our recipient. The college does most of the work to get us a non-traditional scholarship recipient so this isn't an onerous task. Maybe this is where you want to contribute your time to Zonta.

Narges Mohammadí fights against oppression of women to earn Nobel Peace Príze

The 2023 Nobel Peace Prize has been awarded to jailed Iranian activist Narges Mohammadi for "her fight against the oppression of women in Iran and her fight to promote human rights and freedom for all,"

Mohammadi, 51, has been sentenced to more than **30** years in prison, and has been banned from seeing her husband and children. Her name has become synonymous with the battle for human rights in Iran. According to the Norwegian Nobel Committee the regime has arrested her **13** times, convicted her **5** times, and sentenced her to a total of **31** years in prison, and **154** lashes.



Comea update on Pet Shelter

Keeping "family" together ...

If you follow us on Facebook, you have seen posts asking for help in housing the fur babies of some of our residents. Homelessness is never planned and so when it happens, families and individuals, are often faced with the difficult choice of giving up shelter, or giving up their pets. This has always been a

concern and thankfully, the Cheyenne Animal Shelter has provided temporary care for these animals, but folks are taking a bit longer than the 30 day pet policy to regain independence. For some, being separated for even 30 days is too long. Affordable housing is scarce, jobs are competitive, and mental and physical challenges are plentiful. Losing a pet, only adds to the anxiety and stress of becoming homeless, especially for someone with other challenges.

Over the summer, a private donor, pledged \$5,000 to help kick-start the plans for an on-site pet shelter strictly for the residents of COMEA. We contacted our general contractor for estimates on completing this project. The estimate is below:

Building (insulate/seal)- \$15,000

Electrical capability- \$8,000 (trenching and running cable)

Shelving and crates- \$1,200

Fence for exercise area- \$2,500

Heating and cooling system- \$4,700

Annual Electricity Costs (annual estimate)- \$10,000

Supplies (food/litter, annually)- \$8,000

Veterinarian fund-\$6,000 (estimated annually)

Building cost- \$36,400 (less \$5K gift) = \$31,400 Annual operating costs- \$24,000



We anticipate being able to manage up to 4 large dogs, 6 small dogs, and 8 cats. Other exotic pets will be considered on a case by case basis. We may not be able to accommodate every pet, as some come with very unique needs, but we hope to cover the most common.

We want to ensure the space has adequate heat in winter and cooling in summer. Residents will be expected to exercise and entertain their animal daily and keep the individual crates clean. Caseworkers will monitor the interactions between pet and person, to make sure the animals are cared for and safe. We will encourage proper population control and will expect all animals to get the required shots. Cost will be the deciding factor with these expectations but being a responsible pat parent is part of the recovery process in regaining independence.

Any pet that is abandoned at COMEA, will be relinquished to the animal shelter for adoption. We are not looking to get into the animal shelter business, but simply want to make homelessness, less challenging or stressful than it already is,
